NASF Range Expansion Leads to NDOT Roadway Changes

The Nevada Department of Transportation's virtual public information meeting began July 3 to gather public feedback on alternatives to realign State Route 361 between Gabbs and Middlegate in advance of the future expansion of the Navy's Fallon Range Training Complex. The public can view the project information and provide comments by visiting the virtual public meeting at dot.nv.gov/SR361 anytime between July 3 and August 4, 2023. Both English and Spanish language versions are available.

An in-person open house public meeting was held Tuesday, July 18 between 4-7 p.m. at the Fallon Convention Center, 100 Campus Way, with the formal presentation beginning at 5:30 p.m.

The meeting is to let the traveling public, business owners, and residents know about the proposed roadway realignment alternatives and the potential impacts of each alternative, as well as the next steps in the process, and to solicit public feedback regarding the development and evaluation of the alternatives. The meeting is being held in cooperation with the Bureau of Land Management, the Federal Highway Administration, and the U. S. Navy.

SR 361 connects U.S. 95 south of Hawthorne to U.S. 50 at Middlegate, east of Fallon. A portion of SR 361 is within the U.S. Navy's Fallon Range Training Complex future expansion area. The road will be moved outside the expansion area for public safety. A recommended new realignment would move the highway eastward for approximately 13 miles between Gabbs and Middlegate. The potential new alignments are not projected to add notable travel time or distance.

This initial planning-level study, known as the SR 361 Alignment Alternative Development Study, is a Planning and Environmental Linkages study to gather feedback to identify and screen several potential routes for the new section of roadway.

Information and recommendations from the study will be used in





the subsequent environmental study to be completed before construction. Future phases of the project will include additional public outreach and detailed design and environmental review information.

NDOT receives funding for the realignment process from the U.S.

Navy via the Federal Highway Administration.

Search and Rescue's Heroic Efforts at Lake Lahontan

Churchill County Sheriff Richard Hickox released a statement last week commending the efforts of the local Search and Rescue team recently at Lake Lahontan. According to Hickox, on the evening of July 1, members of the Churchill County SAR team were staged at Lake Lahontan to assist as needed. Shortly before 5 p.m., the team heard cries for help coming from a swimmer nearby. A male subject had swam out to retrieve a small raft that had floated away from shore and had drifted out further than expected. The distance proved deceptive, the swimmer became exhausted and began calling for help.

Luke Bullis, a member of the SAR team, immediately began swimming out to the exhausted swimmer while other members of the team gathered assistance and a ride from a civilian on a jet ski. Toby Escobar, the SAR member riding passenger on the jet ski, was able to utilize recent training and deployed a throw rope to the swimmer. Escobar then dismounted the jet ski and remained in the water while the exhausted swimmer was taken to shore for medical treatment. SAR members retrieved Escobar a short time later. The rescued swimmer was revived and released on the scene shortly after.

"I want to thank these members of the Churchill County Search and Rescue Unit for their selfless acts

of heroism, and dedication to our community and each other for their actions that day," stated Hickox, commending SAR team members Luke Bullis, Toby Escobar, Michael Gardner, and Walt Stacey. "Thank you for being there, being ready, and being willing to assist. Luke and Toby, you put your own safety at risk for someone else, words are inadequate

to express our gratitude but please note we recognize your heroic and noble actions."

Sheriff Hickox also commended the civilians, wishing to thank them for selflessly offering the use of their Jet Ski and boats to help in the rescue.

3C Summer Boosts Tourism

The 3C Event Complex wrapped up 15 action-packed days in June. The month kicked off with the 2nd Annual Moving Forward Together Traditional Powwow, with more than 1,900 local and out-of-town guests visiting the event as participants and spectators.

There were twelve days of rough stock rodeo, barrel racing, roping, and a finale rodeo provided a boost in tourism and economic impact for Fallon and Churchill County. A total of 28 events were held in conjunction with the 3C events, 23 of which were in the Rafter 3C Arena. From June 13 through 22, 1,663 entries were placed in the individual events including Battle Born Broncs, Lita Scott's Chasing Aces Barrel Race, and the Double Down in Fallon Team Roping, with combined payouts of \$440,000.


The Second Annual Battle Born Broncs saw another sellout crowd, hosting the nation's top PRCA bareback and saddle bronc riders. With broadcasting of the action-packed show on The Cowboy Channel and features of the event on the PRCA ProRodeo social media pages, fans of rough stock from around the nation were able to tune in to the amazing production taking place in the Oasis

of Nevada. Lefty Holman took home the win in the saddle bronc riding with 90 points and Bradlee Miller won the bareback riding with 89 points. This year's PRCA Youth Camp was also a success with more than 80 youth athletes in attendance to finetune their skills in rough stock with instruction from the PRCA rodeo professionals.

The Double Down in Fallon
Team Roping presented by UllmanPeterson Events brought upwards of
1,200 teams to the area for a full week
of competitive roping with generous payouts. The roping, featured
on Ropers Sports News, helped set a
precedent that will attract more highcaliber equestrian events to Churchill
County.


The final event to cap out the action was the de Golyer Bucking Horse and Bull Bash, bringing 640 concert attendees to the 90s country legend Doug Stone concert and 4,000 rodeo enthusiasts to the local rodeo.

As the 3C event producers look to 2024, the goal is to double both the number of entries and the total payouts to contestants. Churchill County and Fallon will continue to host topnotch events throughout the year and look forward to future events in the 3C Event Complex, both recurring and new.


Gwen was preceded in death by her parents and sister Madge Daz.

Public Comments Requested for Emergency Planning

An update to the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan is being supervised by the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) which is gathering information and seeking input from residents and the public.

The City of Fallon, Churchill County, and the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe have launched the planning effort to update their Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The plan is used to assess risks to life and property posed by natural and manmade disasters and to identify ways to reduce those risks and is required as a pre-requisite for receiving certain forms of federal disaster assistance under the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000.

The public is invited to participate in the plan update including a public questionnaire and a review/public comments of the draft plan. All comments received from the public will be documented and considered for the plan. Public meetings for input and comments on the plan will be announced this summer and fall. Begin by participating in a brief local hazards survey at: https://que7lfsr6.supersurvey.com. The survey will close on September 1, 2023.

The LEPC plans to present the draft plan to the Churchill County Commissioners for adoption in late 2023 before final submission to FEMA.

School District Addresses Bus System, Staffing, and Behavior

To improve the transportation system for students who must ride the bus to and from school, the Churchill County School District Board received a report last week during their regular board meeting on a new system that will be used to simplify transportation for families and district staff.

Transportation Supervisor Natasha Domes presented information about the StopFinder app which will be used with the Transfinder routing software to provide real-time information to parents about their child's bus schedule. Through the program, alerts will be sent to parents if for some reason the bus changes, if the bus driver changes, or if the bus is running late (See "App Advances ChurchillSD Student Transportation)".

Currently, there are 18 bus routes and 18 drivers, a bonus in a department that for several years has experienced bus driver shortages. There are also four monitors, five sub-drivers, and four staff drivers. During the first few weeks of school, the district will have a standby bus ready to pick up overflow on routes if buses reach capacity, and ongoing evaluation regarding the number of students and route adjustments will be made based on student load. Two routes have been added this

year for routes that had the largest number of riders last year.

In other business, Superintendent Derild Parsons reported that the district that a Job Fair was held on July 19 as the district continued with hiring and recruitment efforts; before the fair, there were 43 positions open within the school district. A written report was provided by Human Resources Manager Annette Cooper regarding the Exit Survey from the 2022-23 school year. The district had 33 employees resign or retire at the end of the school year, 14 of whom provided information about their experience working for the district. According to the report, "While they had concerns, they were hopeful for the future and the changes ahead."

Common among all respondents was a concern regarding salary, lack of communication, and the lack of mutual respect between staff members. "Respondents often framed this lack of mutual respect by stating that they did not feel safe." During the interviews, it was understood that safety meant professionally safe as opposed to bodily

safety.

Čooper said she has worked with Parsons and Assistant Superintendent Stacey Cooper to determine that communication is a focus point within the district and support will be provided as an ongoing process.

The board also approved the hiring of Kathryn Bervin-Mueller as the Director of Learning and Innovation. She has a wide variety of experience, serving as a Charter School Principal and the Principal at the Willow Springs Center, a residential treatment center for youth, serving students from 12 to 17 years of age. Parsons said she also has experience working with Medicaid and will assist the district in getting that system set up to benefit students, and has experience working with data, and speaks several languages.

Assistant Superintendent Cooper presented information about the Behavior Review and the status of behavior reporting. She found three concerns including incorrect categorization of behaviors within Infinite Campus, making it difficult to extract accurate data for analysis and reporting; major behavior events in Infinite Campus were left open, in progress, or unresolved; and disciplinary review procedures unknown and inconsistent at various school sites.

Cooper also explained two recent

legislative changes that impact the district in how behavior issues are handled, including AB285 which targets language and responsibility with restorative justice, and AB330 which correlates restorative justice language into behavior plans. Adjustments from these changes include revisions for student placement, including the removal of students from instructional settings.

During her report, Cooper presented information about behavior events at district schools during the 2022-23 school year. There were 239 major behavior events at the high school with 160 students and 32 staff involved. There were 631 minor events. At the middle school, there were 816 major behavior events with 339 students and 50 staff involved. There were 3,127 minor behavior events.

The Fallon Post will continue to provide coverage of the behavioral plan process.

The School Board meets on the second Wednesday of each month at 5:30 p.m.

App Helps Parents with Student Transportation

If your child will ride the school bus this year, check your email for an invitation from StopFinder.

Any School District family intending to use district transportation year may download the Stopfinder app and create an account. Invites were sent by email on Monday, July 17. This will be considered transportation registration for the 23-24 school year.

Families that did not receive a Stopfinder invitation or have students in grades K-8 who live within city limits, are more than ½ mile from their school and require transportation, email stopfinder@churchillcsd.com.

Please use the app to contact transportation by going to your student's contact card, clicking the three dots in the upper right corner, and selecting message. This is the quickest and most efficient way to get a response from transportation. Please note: the stops, routes, and times shown in Stopfinder are approximate. There may be changes before the first day of

school, so continue checking the app for updates.

Stopfinder pulls information from Infinite Campus to create/assign routes. If your address is incorrect in Stopfinder, you need to update it in the Infinite Campus Parent Portal. If you do not have a Parent Portal or are having issues logging into your account, email parentinfo@churchillcsd.com.

The district will follow current Regulation 5144 for all transportation decisions, which includes busing for all county K-12 students. Students



in grades K-8 who live within city limits and are more than ½ mile from their school can use bus stops at preselected sites. Any district family who can provide transportation for their students is encouraged to take their children to school, which is highly appreciated.

District Court News

The Tenth Judicial District Court convened Tuesday, July 11, Judge Thomas Stockard presiding.

Shelley Leanne Sonafrank appeared for sentencing on a Gross Misdemeanor charge of Attempt to Possess a Controlled Substance, a Low Level. Deputy DA Thomas cited Sonafrank's "pattern of being unable to comply with court orders" in asking for 12-48 months in Nevada State Prison. Attorney Paul R. Wolfe told the court his client is an addict who has obtained a Substance Abuse Evaluation which recommends intensive inpatient/ outpatient counseling, he asked for a suspended sentence and probation. Sonafrank told the court she is ashamed of herself and tries to avoid triggers. The judge sentenced her to 19-48 months, suspended, placing her on probation for 24 months. Along with standard conditions of probation, she was ordered to obtain both a Substance Abuse Evaluation and a Mental Health Evaluation and to follow the recommendations of both evaluations. Fees and assessments were imposed.

Troy Errol Jackson appeared for sentencing on a Category B Felony of Battery that Constitutes Violence, a Subsequent Offense. Under plea negotiations, Deputy DA Baker presented a written Victim Impact Statement and stated that under plea negotiations, the state will remain silent. PD Sommer told the court his client has completed an 8-hour online anger management course and intends to take more courses as well as counseling. Sommer read from the victim impact statement, "I do

not think he's a bad guy. And I don't think he deserves to go to jail, or even put on probation. But I do believe he would highly benefit from counseling or anger management classes." The judge sentenced him to 48-100 months in Nevada State Prison, suspended, placing him on probation for 36 months, with the standard conditions, and added the attendance of an anger management course that meets at least weekly for at least 12 months; along with imposing fees and assessments. Jackson was ordered to have no contact with the victim unless approved by his supervising probation officer. Jackson was prohibited from owning, possessing, or having under his control, any firearms. PD Sommer stated that Jackson does not own any firearms and he will submit the written declaration stating so.

Andrea Lynn Lumpkin pleaded Guilty to a Gross Misdemeanor of Abuse, Neglect, or Endangerment of a Child Not Causing Substantial Bodily or Mental Harm which carries a potential penalty is 364 days in Churchill County Jail and a fine of up to \$2,000, Lumpkin having allowed children access to a container of marijuana. As a Psychological Risk Assessment is required for this charge, sentencing was set for October 3.

Chad Anthony Travis Fayerweather pleaded guilty to a Gross Misdemeanor of Abuse, Neglect, or Endangerment of a Child Not Causing Substantial Bodily or Mental Harm which carries a possible sentence of 364 days in Churchill County Jail and a fine of up to \$2,000, Fayerweather having allowed children access to a container of open marijuana. A Psychological Risk

Assessment is required; sentencing was set for October 3.

William August Ehlers II pleaded guilty to a Category E Felony of Possession of a Controlled Substance (methamphetamine). He was sentenced to 12-32 months in Nevada State Prison, suspended, and placed on probation for 18 months. He was ordered to obtain a Substance Abuse Evaluation and to follow the recommendations of the evaluation. Fees and assessments were imposed.

Crystal Lynn Moore was present regarding the violation of the terms and conditions of her pre-trial release. Moore had been returned to custody and posted bail. The purpose of her appearance was to ensure she was still being tested by Court Services. Court Services reported she was tested yesterday. If she violates again, Moore is to remain in custody until she has a negative test. Moore pleaded guilty to charges in May; sentencing is set for August 15.

Evelyn Gissell Diaz-Dircio was present for sentencing on a Category E Felony of Possession of a Controlled Substance, and a Category D Felony of Failure to Appear after admission of bail. DDA Thomas stated that the E Felony requires mandatory probation, and the defendant has been participating in Drug Court. PD Noel asked for diversion for his client, telling the court that the defendant is "doing very well in addressing some of the underlying cause of her addiction and getting some of the tools and resources to help deal with those." The judge found Diaz-Dircio eligible for diversion, suspended proceedings, and ordered 12-24 months probation. The defendant was ordered to complete the Western Regional Drug Court program; obtain a Substance

Abuse Evaluation and follow the recommendations of the evaluation; complete her GED within the next 12 months; and maintain gainful employment while on probation. Fees and assessments were imposed.

Julie Ann Holmes, in custody, under competency evaluations from two doctors, was found competent to stand trial and pleaded guilty to a Category E Felony of Possession of a Controlled Substance (methamphetamine), and guilty to a Gross Misdemeanor of Battery on an Officer. On the Gross Misdemeanor charge, Holmes was reinstated on probation with the additional condition of serving the next 4 weekends in Churchill County Jail. On the E Felony charge, the court suspended the proceedings, placed Holmes on probation for 12-24 months, and ordered her to enter and complete the Western Regional Specialty Courts including Drug Court and/or Mental Health Court. She was ordered to obtain a comprehensive evaluation to include Substance Abuse and Mental Health Evaluations, and to follow the recommendations thereof. Fees and assessments were imposed. Holmes was ordered to remain in custody until she begins Drug Court.


Angelica Leticia Lopez-Rickards, in custody, appeared for a Judicial Review regarding Competency. The Court received Competency Evaluations from two doctors. Both evaluations state that at current, Lopez-Rickards is not competent; however, there is a substantial probability that she can be treated to competency. The judge ordered she remain in custody until she is sent to Lake's Crossing to be treated to

competency.

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Justice Court Update

New River Township Justice Court convened Thursday, July 13, Judge Benjamin Trotter presiding.

Gary Vargas appeared for a status hearing related to a first-offense misdemeanor domestic battery. Vargas was initially charged with Domestic Battery by Strangulation, Interruption of a 911 call, and False Imprisonment at the time of his arrest in early May. According to Vargas's defense attorney, Richard Mozello, Esq., law enforcement was called to his client's residence a few times over the last year for domestic disputes. In May, the situation escalated into what he phrased as "bad behavior" when yelling, pushing, and shoving ensued. According to the plea agreement between Vargas and the District Attorney's Office, Vargas will serve the statutory minimums based on the victim's wishes. He must serve 36 hours in jail to complete the mandated two days, 48 hours of community service, and attend counseling for six months.

Daniel Villagrana appeared for a status hearing related to unpaid restitution. According to Senior Deputy District Attorney Chelsea Sandford,

Villagrana agreed to pay \$1,000 toward damages caused by a traffic accident but has only paid \$250 in restitution since the order in May. "He is continuing to victimize the injured party," said Sanford. Villagrana was arrested last November by NHP on a DUI with no driver's license, no insurance, an obstructed windshield, and no registration. He was arrested again in April for DUI, purchasing alcohol for a minor, driving without a valid driver's license, and failure to maintain a lane. According to Villagrana, he now has a job and can begin paying restitution as agreed. The judge ordered him to have a full payment to the court by July 28, or he will be held in contempt of court.

Phillip Wilcox appeared for a status hearing related to a 2020 arrest for Battery Constituting Domestic Battery by Strangulation, Child Neglect/Endangerment. Wilcox was ordered to complete community service. According to Wilcox, he has not finished the hours required as he has been homeless for the last two months and now has custody of his daughter. He told the judge he recently found housing, has a reliable ride, and has arrangements made with the senior center in Silver Springs to complete his community

service hours. The judge set a status hearing for July 20, at which time Wilcox must provide proof to the court of the hours of community service he has completed.

Audrey Ottesen appeared via Zoom from Montana for sentencing on a DUI first offense received in February. Both Wright Noel with the Churchill County Public Defender's Office and Deputy ADA Sanford requested the minimum sentence for Ottesen. According to Noel, her DUI was of another case heard in District Court in which Ottesen spent a significant amount of time in jail. She received time served for the statutory 48 hours, and fines were deemed paid as this sentence is to run concurrently with the District Court sentence per her plea agreement.

Jerry Miller appeared for arraignment on felony burglary charges for entering a vehicle intending to commit burglary, punishable by 1-10 years in prison, and two gross misdemeanors for unlawful entry of vehicles intending to commit larceny. Churchill County Public Defender Jacob Sommers was assigned to represent Miller, who requested Miller be released on his own recognizance. The judge denied the request based on Sanford's report that

Miller has a history of failure to appear violations (9) and that he listed Stockman's Casino as his residential address. A status hearing was set for July 20. *Continuances*:

Hubert Allen: In custody, continued to August 3.

Kevin Chico: Continued to July 27. Debra Lund: Felony embezzlement charges of \$25,000 or more, but less than \$100,000 continued to August 24.

Heather Walter: In custody, waived hearing to District Court.

What's Cooking in Kelli's Kitchen - Summer Salads

This is the time of year (or the temperature of the year) when I generally opt to prepare food outside. This necessitates that I go out, where it is hot, to stand over a smoker or a barbeque, which adds to the heat. The alternative generally requires making it hotter inside the house, which is undesirable, to say the least. This last weekend was hot as balls and I didn't want to cook at all. Fortunately, there are a variety of recipes out there that require more "assembling" and less "cooking." Here are a handful of recipes that are delicious and will keep you nourished on those days when the last thing that you want to do is increase the heat.

Fresh Chicken Salad with Balsamic Dressing

INGREDIENTS:

1 rotisserie chicken or 12 oz of pulled chicken meat ¼ c balsamic vinegar ¼ c Dijon mustard 1/4 c soy sauce 2 T sugar 1 t salt ½ t black pepper 1 c olive oil 1 pear, cut into 1" pieces 1 lemon, juiced 8 oz pack of mixed lettuce (I like the herb blend) 1/3 lb green beans, cut into 1" pieces 1 pt cherry tomatoes, cut in half ½ red onion, minced 2 avocados, cut into cubes

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. If using rotisserie chicken, remove the meat from the bones and set aside.
- 2. For the dressing: add vinegar, mustard, soy sauce, sugar, salt, and black pepper into a food processor and pulse until combined. With the machine on low, drizzle in the olive oil until emulsified and creamy.
- 3. Assembly: in a large bowl, drizzle pears with lemon juice. Add leafy greens, beans, tomatoes, red onion, avocado, and half of the chicken meat. Add some dressing and toss so all the ingredients are lightly coated. Divide the mixture into serving bowls and top with the remaining chicken. Serve with additional dressing.

Chicken and Herb Salad - with Vietnamese Dressing

INGREDIENTS:

2 T sugar
1 garlic clove, minced
1 Thai chile, minced with seeds
2 limes, juiced
3 T fish sauce
12 oz pulled chicken meat
½ small cabbage, shredded
1 small cucumber, sliced thin
1 red bell pepper, stemmed, seeded, and thinly sliced
1 c arugula
1 bunch basil leaves
1 bunch mint leaves


Crispy fried shallots or onions for garnish

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. In a large bowl, combine sugar and ¼ c warm water. Whisk until sugar is dissolved. Add in the garlic, chile, lime juice, and fish sauce.

- 3. Add the arugula, mint, and basil. Toss to coat.
