Octane Fest Roars Through Fallon this Weekend

Octane Fest kicks off with an action-packed lineup of events on Friday that lead into Saturday, featuring all kinds of high-powered dirt track motorsports racing.

Motorheads from all over Nevada and the west will be heading to the Oasis of Nevada for the action-packed lineup.

Starting Friday at 7 p.m. drive up to Rattlesnake Hill to experience the thrill of circle track races, timed tough trucks, trailer races, and demolition derby. On Saturday, beginning at 6 p.m. the excitement continues with more circle track races followed by contact tough trucks, chain races, and a figure 8 race. Also revving their engines are top drag cars from across the west who will converge at Top Gun Dragstrip which hosts the NHRA Pacific National Open Series this weekend at the racetrack located 17 miles south of Fallon on June 10 through the 12. The Junior Drag Racing League will also race as well at the ET Summit Series. The track opens at 7 a.m. on Friday with races scheduled over three days. deGolyer Bucking Horse and Bull Bash on Tap June 25

Cody and Kristina deGolyer have worked hard over the past eight years to build an event that can be enjoyed by the entire family and the surrounding northern Nevada community. They decided to start the rodeo after they took their four kids to the Reno Rodeo one summer. Kristina said once they got there and the kids saw the carnival and got wrist bands for \$30 each and then food, "We got home \$600 later and realized you shouldn't have to go broke going out with your family."

Cody added that they thought it was important to keep Rodeo in Fallon. "This is a rodeo community, it's our culture," he

They talked it over for the next couple of days and then, "We went down to Parks and Recreation and talked to Cindy and rented the fairgrounds for a two-day event. We didn't even know what we were doing," laughs Kristina.

The first two years were rough, they said, "We hocked the boat to pay for rough stock," said Cody. "Now we have continuous sponsors who support us and make this possible for the community."

In addition to the rodeo on Saturday night, there is a family/kid zone with water slides, bounce houses, and face painting. There are several food vendors along with booths for merchandise. And this year the deGoylers are adding a BBQ and Barn Dance on Friday night.



For \$25 adults can get tri-tip and beans dinner, \$10 for kids, and enjoy live music from Steven Christie who is

> playing with friends in a band they call Stillwater Legends. The BBQ starts at 7 p.m. There will be dancing to 90s country and bluegrass music along with a cash bar, all held in the Dry Gulch building.

Attendees can also win prizes with a \$250 gas card being raffled off for filling out the event survey, and a hay raffle of 20 bales of alfalfa from Abe's Feed with the proceeds going to support the sponsorship of youth rodeo contestants.

There are currently 135 contestants signed up for bull riding, ranch bronc riding, team roping, barrel racing, breakaway, and best of all - wild cow milking. Not to mention the junior events, steer riding, calf riding, and mutton busting.

The Rodeo starts on Saturday at 6 p.m. and will be held in the outdoor arena. All tickets are \$10 and can be pre-purchased at Big R or online at rodeoticket.com. Tickets will be

available at the gate.

"The grandstand holds 3,000 people and last year we had close to 4,500 for standing room only," said Cody. "We had to stop selling tickets at the gate."

AAUW Honors Barbara Evans as Woman of the Year



Emergency Communications Field Day-June 25th

ARRL Field Day is ham radio's open house. Every June, more than 40,000 hams throughout North America set up temporary transmitting stations in public places to demonstrate ham radio's science, skill, and service to our communities and our nation. It combines public service, emergency preparedness, community outreach, and technical skills all in a single event. Field Day has been an annual event since 1933 and remains the most popular event in ham radio.

Ŵĥen hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans, within a couple of days all communications were out except for a few satellite phones that still had battery power and amateur (ham) radio. All telephone landlines and cell phones were down. A thousand amateur radio operators came to the area with their radios, power, provisions, and shelter, to provide emergency communications support for the area. Amateur radio was about the only function that worked well in the disaster. While hurricanes are not likely here, cyber-attacks on our power grid, electromagnetic pulse weapons, or extreme sun activity could easily put us into a situation like Katrina – locally, regionally, and nationally.

Amateur radio operators are organized in emergency support groups like the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) division of the Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL). ARES operates in Churchill County (Churchill County ARES) and supports emergency communications for the county, NAS Fallon, TCID, and outside organizations like the Red Cross. One of the ways ARES trains for emergency deployments is by participating in an annual Field Day event each year. We go out to a field location and operate without "shore power" for 24 hours, making radio contacts around the region and country. We test radios, antennas, and other equipment while honing our skills in the art. There are numerous frequency bands and modes




that can be used, and results are greatly affected by atmospheric conditions, sunspots, and interference. There are a lot of skills required to get everything to work.

Radio amateurs are licensed by the FCC and have to pass exams to qualify to use most of the high frequency (shortwave) bands used for over-the-horizon long distance communications. Volunteers often invest thousands of dollars of their own money to buy all of the radio and support equipment (e.g., solar panels and generators) needed. The higher-end equipment can get expensive, it is very easy and inexpensive for new operators to get a basic Technician license and a handheld radio capable of talking through local mountain-top repeaters that extend the local area range. This is a great first step in emergency preparedness, and while many new operators get licensed for this purpose, amateur radio is also a fun hobby. Our local club Amateur Radio of Churchill County (ARCC) holds monthly meetings with most topics on the hobby side.

ARCC's local Field Day event this year is on Saturday, June 25th at 11 a.m. at the Stillwater National Wildlife Refuge - Lead Lake Campsite. We will be operating three stations and will have a Get On The Air station where visitors, including children, can get on the radio and give it a try (with one of us present). There are no age restrictions on getting a license. Come out and you can see what we do, and we will be happy to get you on the air and tell you more about amateur radio.

Banner Auxiliary Donations Save Lives and Backs

In January 2008, 590 homes were flooded in Fernley when the Truckee Canal breached, resulting in an \$18 million settlement to victims.

Fifteen years later, water right owners in the Truckee-Carson Irrigation District are faced with a \$35 million bill to line 3.5 miles of the Truckee Canal through the Fernley community. But for the repairs to begin this fall, electors in the district must approve a year-long outage of the Truckee-Canal and a contract with the Bureau of Reclamation to repay the costs of the project.

The Special Election is scheduled for June 30, 2022, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. TCID will be holding public workshops in both Fallon and Fernley to give water right owners a chance for questions and answers about the Extraordinary Maintenance Project and the Special Election.

"People don't understand we need to do this, either repair the canal and continue to enjoy the use of our water or the flow will be reduced by regulation and greatly impact our rights," said Rusty Jardine, General Manager of TCID. He explained that should the electors vote no, the Bureau of Reclamation will reduce the flow in the canal to 140 cubic feet per second to sustain the safe use of the canal which would, "greatly reduce the capacity and injure everyone in the Carson Division of the project as well."

He said the BOR has established a 90% risk associated with the current use of the canal in the short term.

Originally, the Environmental Impact Statement and Record of Decision on the canal lining that was completed in 2020, listed a preferred alternative that would line the entire 12 miles of the Fernley Reach of the canal.

According to Jardine, "Reclamation determined that lining the critical 3.5 miles of the Fernley Reach as the most risk prone if there were a breach in those areas. This would address the risk, for the time being, protecting homes, lives, and property."

The lining of the 3.5 miles of canal allows the district to maintain a diversion rate of up to 500 CFS through the canal. "The Truckee Canal has been the champion of the Carson Division," said Jardine, "at times providing 75% of the flow for the project."

The City of Fernley has filed a lawsuit to prevent the lining, maintaining the underground municipal water supply will be negatively impacted. Several studies have shown that the underground water supply in Fernley

and Fallon is recharged by the irrigation system of the Newlands Project.

The current plan to complete the lining project, should voters approve the proposal is to shut down the Truckee Canal as soon as this water season is over and begin construction by October 1. Jardine suspects the project will be out of water because of the drought, by the end of September. He says the project is dependent on weather and de-watering

the canal, with substantial dirt-work being required before a geomembrane lining is installed and welded. The process requires a concrete layer to be applied to the lining within two weeks and is time sensitive.


"We won't have this shot again," said Jardine. The BOR has approved funding for no more than \$35 million, "which requires a vote of the electors because water right holders are required to pay back that funding."

He said that if the District General Fund is not enough, there may be an increase in the Operation and Maintenance fees the water right owners pay.

If electors vote no, Jardine says it will be "catastrophic," reducing flows in the Truckee Canal from 500 CFS to 140 CFS. "That means only 100 CFS would reach Lahontan Reservoir, and Fernley users would be required to utilize pumps to get water out of the canal, and water rights owners would be severely injured."

He recognized the severity of shutting off the Truckee Canal, saying, "this is a tremendous sacrifice by all the water right owners, lining the canal will restore it to full use. It will be safe, and we don't have to worry about turning down the flow in a regulated drought."

City Council Actions for June 7

On Tuesday, June 7 the Fallon City Council's agenda for its first regularly scheduled June meeting included applications for a new drinking establishment liquor license and three engineering services projects.

Jennifer and Barry Vasquez, as the new owners of Pizza Barn LLC, applied for a liquor license. They have not owned or managed a business in the past. Jennifer told the council she is a schoolteacher and would be managing the restaurant when not in school. She will also have her husband Barry and Nicole Rogne as co-managers, assuring the council that there would always be a manager on site during all business hours. The applicants were also required to file a supplemental form with the City Police Department attesting to that as well. Their application was approved.

The council heard from Public Works Director Brian Byrd who discussed the engineering services contract requests on the agenda starting with a professional services contract with Lumos and Associates. The contract is in the amount of \$139,000 for engineering design, construction project management, and documentation services for the Court Street reconstruction. A total of 750 linear feet from Nevada Street to East Street will be redone for a total cost of \$821,000. Byrd told the council they will also receive a \$405,000 Community Development Block Grant toward the project costs. Per the proposal submitted

start in the Fall of 2022.

The next request was for a second professional services contract with Lumos in the amount of \$90,950 for civil engineering, project management, and documentation services for a new splash pad and pavilion to be located at Oats Park on the north side of the city pool. Byrd told the council the city will utilize

by Lumos, construction is expected to



approximately one acre to provide the public with a splash park experience for water play activities. It will have a nonslip safety surface, various water nozzles, and playground like features that can spray, shower, rain, mist and shoot streams of water. It will be fenced from other portions of the park but will have access to and from the existing pool area. The plan includes multiple pavilions that can be reserved for parties and other events. The total construction cost was not provided.

The third request was for a professional services contract with J-U-B Engineers, Inc for services related to completing facilities plans for the potential expansion of the city's wastewater treatment plant in the amount of \$190,2000. Byrd told the council that the plant

currently handles 1.2 million gallons per day and has the capacity to handle up to 2.2 million gallons per day. The new plan will establish projected flows for the next 20 years, document permit requirements while identifying long-term permit issues, evaluate existing processes and performance, and develop recommendations to maintain proper service levels for future growth. Byrd emphasized that the plant still has capacity however, "Public Works would like to ensure that the plant can stay ahead of the curve to support the city's housing growth taking place now and in the future."

The council approved all three public works projects.

The council's next regular bi-monthly meeting is scheduled for June 21 in the Council Chambers at 9 a.m.





CCSD Serving Summer Meals

Staff Report

The Summer Food Service Program has been around and administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for many years. This will be the first year the school district is administering the program in conjunction with the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe and the Fallon Youth Club.

The program has extremely strict rules set by the USDA through federal law. Some of the rules were put in abeyance during the past two years due to the pandemic. These rules have returned. It

is no longer possible to simply drop by, pick up food and take it away for off-site consumption. The district understands that having to eat on-site isn't an ideal situation for many families but to serve the children of the community all of the USDA regulations must be adhered to.

In addition to having to eat on-site, only youth 18 years of age and younger are served free meals. Individuals 19 and older may not share any part of a child's meal. If the youth's sponsor has authorized it, a program participant can leave the site with either one piece of fruit, one vegetable, or one grain item from

their meal. If anyone participating in the program has a life-threatening allergy or disability that requires meal substitutions a statement from a recognized medical authority must be submitted that includes the required alternative food items.

The school administration appreciates the community's support with these rules so that children ages 0-18 in our community, who are the most in need, have access to hot and/or cold breakfasts, lunches, snacks, and dinners during the summer months.

Getting Real About Mental Health The Amygdala – My Favorite Part of the Brain

If you ask anyone who's taken one of my groups, or a therapy session with me, they will tell you that my favorite part of the brain is the amygdala. Now you would think that having an education I would revere the frontal cortex, but the amygdala holds so many surprises and controls our reactions to emotions: emotions mostly based on fear. Have you heard of the "flight or fight" response? Add onto that the freeze response and you have the main functions of the amygdala.

The Amygdala is found in the temporal lobe of the brain. There are 2 amygdalae, one for each cerebral hemisphere. It gets its name from its almond-like shape. The amygdala is part of the limbic system - a group of structures linked to the processing of emotions, again mainly the fearful emotions. The amygdala is involved in identifying threats and initiating a flight, fight, or freeze response. Recent evidence indicates that the amygdala is active during the processing of positive stimuli as well. The amygdala may be involved with assigning a positive or negative value to stimuli and with the consolidation of memories that have a strong positive or negative emotional component. Research continues to better understand the amygdala's role in other behaviors ranging from addiction to social interaction.

So why is this my favorite part of the brain? Because you can learn to hack your amygdala and rewire your brain to change your reactions to, and resulting behaviors from, negative or positive emotions and stimuli. When the amygdala is stimulated you get a rush of adrenalin and cortisol. Your system is instantaneously flooded with enough of these hormones to allow you to react to whatever the stimulus is. If someone jumps out and yells boo, your heart jumps, and you are instantly able to run, punch them, or freeze in place. The amygdala gave you the hormones you need to do this. If you receive that call that you just won a million dollars in the lottery your heart jumps, and you can leap into the air and run around the house yelling and crying. Again, the amygdala gave you the hormones, energy, and strength to do this.

The downside of the amygdala is that it's also the part of the brain that causes you to experience anxiety, panic attacks, and physical symptoms of worry. When your brain makes up stories (worries) the Amygdala believes them to be true and floods your system with adrenalin and cortisol so that you are ready for the worst to happen. But those stories may or may not come true and you might have created the perfect scenario for the amygdala, at a detriment to you, to do its job.

The criteria for a diagnosis of anxiety are intense, excessive, and persistent worry and fear about everyday situations. Anxiety disorders involve repeated episodes of sudden feelings of intense anxiety and fear which interfere with daily activities and are difficult to control and can reach a peak within minutes (panic attacks). Anxiety is one of the most prevalent self-diagnoses that I hear

from people coming in for counseling.

So how can you hack your amygdala and stop the pumping of stress hormones? The amygdala can be rewired. When you worry and ask negative questions like what if this happens? What if that happens? Ask yourself, what if it doesn't happen? Keep asking this. Make your brain shut down the amygdala and allow your frontal cortex to light up and think about how to solve the question. The question what if it doesn't happen triggers the brain to think differently, to solve the question positively. Another way to hack the brain is to desensitize yourself from the stimuli which trigger the amygdala. If your fear is of dogs, you can work with a pet therapist to slowly allow yourself to be exposed to gentle dogs for short periods until you are comfortable being around dogs. This is a simplified example that can take weeks or months, but you get the

You can make the choice to rewire your brain and turn off, or calm, your amygdala by working with a therapist. Why is it my favorite part of the brain? Because it allows us to physically express emotions.

What's Cookin' in Kelli's Kitchen - On Retreat

I am sending this missive from the banks of the Molalla River in Canby, Oregon outside of Portland. I am in retreat. I have temporarily withdrawn from the daily demands of my normal life to gather with other food systems leaders from across the country in a precious space. Our purpose is to form a community; to envision what our local, regional, and national food system could be; and to create a roadmap toward achieving that vision. As I prepared for this journey, I wasn't entirely sure what I should expect, but I imagined that it would be akin to my childhood experiences at summer camp, and I wasn't that far off

Sleep-away camp for food systems leaders is a magical place. We are in a place of great beauty-there is so much green. Gathered along the banks of a swiftly moving river, our group has coalesced around campfires and sitting cross-legged on lawns peppered with daisies and visited by bees and butterflies. We were strangers connected by a thread - a shared passion and conviction for building a more equitable and sustainable food system in the United States. The magic of this place and this space is that now, everyone who is here is connected by shared experience. This retreat is still happening, and I know it will take me some time to wrap my head around everything that I have learned, thought about, and envisioned over the last few days. But that doesn't stop me from wanting to share the magic with you.

What is it that makes retreat such a powerful

word and even more powerful experience? I believe that being on retreat compels us to slow down, breathe a little deeper, and be more present in our bodies and our spaces. This week, I have set down so much of what I have been carrying for the last two years. I didn't even know that I was so bone-deep tired. In this community, I have allowed myself to be vulnerable, I have held others up in their vulnerabilities. That is not something that happens enough in our regular lives. Together we have been nourished, our cups filled up and I know when I board a plane tomorrow bound for Reno, I will feel refreshed and empowered, ready to go back to working tirelessly in support of our Fallon farmers and our larger community.

A retreat is sacred. Nourishing our souls and tending to our hearts is just as vital as nourishing our bodies. I hope that you are all able to find places like this one with groups of your people, people who nourish and uplift you, inspire and challenge you, and with whom you can forge a vision of the world in which you want to live.

I am about to head down to the dining hall where I will fill my plate with food made in a camp kitchen from produce sourced from local Oregon farms. After dinner, there is a dance party. The DJ is a part of Questlove's crew. This camp is a magical place. My job tomorrow is to carry this moment with me as I return to normal life, the lessons, the connections, the inspiration, and the magic. For now, all I have to do is be present.

Sleep-Away Camp Tomato Soup

For Peter-who, when I asked what recipe I should write about, promptly answered Tomato Soup because Tomato Soup is a metaphor for life, then he walked away.

INGREDIENTS:

2 T unsalted butter

2 T extra-virgin olive oil

1 medium onion, very thinly sliced

3 garlic cloves, smashed

5 cups canned whole tomatoes in their juice (from three 14-ounce cans)

1 cup water

2/3 cup heavy cream

1 T sugar

1/4 t crushed red pepper


1/4 t celery seed

1/4 t dried oregano

DIRECTIONS:

1. In a large saucepan, melt 1 T of the butter in 1 tablespoon of the olive oil. Add the sliced onion and smashed garlic and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally, until softened about 5 minutes. Add the tomatoes and their juice, the water, heavy cream, sugar, crushed red pepper, celery seed, and oregano. Season with salt and pepper. Bring the soup to a boil over high heat, breaking up the tomatoes with the back of a spoon. Reduce the heat to moderate and simmer for 10 minutes.

2. Working in batches, transfer the tomato soup to a blender and puree until smooth. Return the soup to a clean pot and rewarm the soup if necessary. Season the soup with salt and pepper, as needed.




